- Lead this quick cognitive warm up to build attention, processing speed, nimbleness and other cognitive skills, as well as group connection.
- Ask students to take turns rhyming words to the prompts you provide. Continue with the same prompt until the students run out of rhyming words, then start fresh with a new prompt. Work until time is up.
- Have everyone clap or snap fingers to set a good pace.
- When repeating this class, use new prompts.
- Encourage distance learners to join in from home.

Length of a football field in feet: 360

The year the constitution was written: 1787

The five colors of the Olympic rings: blue, yellow, black, green and red

Number of countries in the world: 195

The seven continents of the world: North America, South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, Antarctica

The difference between African elephants and Asian elephants: The Ears. African elephants have much larger ears that look like the continent of Africa, while Asian elephants have smaller, round ears.
